
### **Shooting Stars**


### LIFT at Brutonville Community Center

Eleven ladies completed the Lifelong Improvements through Fitness Together program at Brutonville Community Center. Among them, Regina Wall was honored with a perfect attendance award – indicating that yes, she attended EVERY SINGLE one of the 16 sessions of the program. Every participant that completed the pro-



gram demonstrated improvements in functional fitness testing, and all reported growth in their personal goals. Best of all, this group plans to continue meeting and working hard even without FCS staff present. THIS is indeed exactly the goals of our programming—to give you the resources needed to empower you to live your best life. Congratulations Brutonville Community!

### Teen Cuisine at Green Ridge Elementary



Twelve fifth-grade students completed the Teen Cuisine program at Green Ridge Elementary School, and demonstrated significant growth in knowledge. Prior to the program, the average score on a basic food preparation knowledge test was 53.8%- that score soared all the way to 89.1% by the time the program completed. During the program, students learned about nutrition and basic food preparation skills. To extend learning, youth prepared at

least one recipe (sometimes two) at every session. To conclude the program, we held a Family Celebration night where families were invited to come and learn about nutrition and the things their children had learned during the program. At this time, students prepared a light

meal for their family members to enjoy. Parents reported observing their children drinking more water, trying more fruits and vegetables, being more active, and paying more attention in general to things they ate. Additionally, parents report their children wanting to help cook more at home, which has huge benefits to families – especially those with multiple young children. One parent shared, "When we go to the grocery store, she reads the nutrition labels for me and helps me decide what foods are better for our household." This highly successful program was offered in collaboration with North Carolina Cooperative Extension Montgomery County and Communities in Schools. Special thanks to Dr. Miller, principal of Green Ridge Elementary School for working with us to offer this program.

# Real Money. Real World.

Financial Literacy For Youth



More than twenty-five volunteers gathered at Montgomery Central High School to assist with the spending simulation for Real Money, Real World on Friday, November 19<sup>th</sup>. During this event, seniors were assigned an occupation, salary, and family size, and charged with the goal of making their money stretch through an entire month after visiting each of

14 stations requiring payment (housing, food, child care, utilities, entertainment, transportation, etc.) Many students and volunteers reported that this was a very eye-opening experience. Students saw the biggest learning improvement (89%) when it came to understanding the costs to care for a child, followed by how to make wise financial decisions (85%). Students also learned the importance of having a spending plan to meet various living expenses and needs,

the importance of asking questions before making purchase, and waiting until they are financially ready before having children. We are so thankful for the huge community support and volunteers that assisted in this program including the Town of Biscoe, Town of Troy, Montgomery Insurance, Montgomery County Partnership for Children, Department of Social Services, Montgomery Community College, First Bank, Montgomery County Department of Health, and Carolina Farm Credit. The program was provided through partnership between North Carolina Cooperative Extension and Communities in Schools of Montgomery County. Special thanks to Anne McLean, principal of Montgomery Central for her partnership and support in implementing this program.











# Elizabeth's Nutrition Nuggets

### Fall Into Better Health

With the holiday season upon us, it seems everywhere we turn there is another table filled with food, from office holiday parties to family get-togethers. Our Nutrition team, with NCA&T University recently had a holiday potluck mainly to promote our programming, and what all we can offer in our communities to help live a healthier lifestyle. Everyone was in charge of making a healthy holiday dish. We had entrees, side dishes, appetizers, drinks, and even a yum-

my dessert. I was a little skeptical about trying some of the things, but I sure am glad I did! We improvised healthier ways to eat for the holidays. We had turkey meatballs, healthy macaroni and cheese, grandma's dressing, green bean casserole, deviled eggs, apple crisp, sweet potato cheesecake, as well as an orange cooler. You can get most of these recipes on MyPlate.gov or any North Carolina Cooperative Extension website. This holiday season I challenge you to make a healthy dish or meal for you and your families. I have one recipe that you and your kiddos or grandkids can make over the holidays.

### **Banana Pancakes**

### Ingredients:

- 2 eggs
- 1 ½ cups non-fat milk or 1% milk
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 3 tablespoons oil
- 2 bananas, mashed
- 34 cup whole wheat flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder



#### Directions:

Beat eggs in medium bowl. Add milk, sugar, oil and bananas and mix well. Add flours and baking powder. Mix gently. Lightly spray a large skillet or griddle with non-stick cooking spray or lightly wipe with oil. Heat skillet or griddle over medium-high heat (350 degrees in electric skillet). Spoon ¼ cup batter onto griddle for each pancake. Cook until tops are bubbly and pancakes are dry around the edges. Flip and cook for 2-3 minutes or until golden brown. Refrigerate leftovers within 2 hours.
