Nutrition Programming with Preschoolers Underway



One of the goals for SNAP-Ed nutrition programming is to provide the Go, Glow, Grow curriculum with all pre-K'ers in Montgomery County, every year. Last year, we successfully met that goal and expect nothing less for the 23-24 fiscal year. We have already begun to imple-

ment the program at Green Ridge Elementary, Troy Elementary and Candor Early Head Start. Plans are in place to launch the program at Star Elementary and Candor Elementary in November. Overall, the program intends to teach youngsters the importance of good nutrition and healthy habits from a very young age. Pre-K students learn about MyPlate and portion size, as well as begin to understand that the foods we eat are responsible for our body's functions. For example, our grain foods (or "go" foods) give us energy to "RUN, JUMP and PLAY ALL DAY". The program includes six weekly classroom lessons including a nutritional taste test. Bilingual newsletters are sent home with every student after every lesson, reinforcing the main points, providing ideas to extend the learning at home, and providing resources for healthy recipes.

Dollars and Sense Program Offered to Fifth Graders



Learning to prioritize spending choices, and determining the difference between needs and wants are key financial concepts that you shouldn't be an adult before you practice. In fact, the younger you learn these concepts, the more opportunity you have to practice these skills before you are on your own. For this reason, we have

partnered with Communities In Schools Montgomery County to implement the Dollars and Sense program with fifth graders. With this project, students engage in meaningful dialogue with each other and the instructor, and then go through a spending simulation. In this simulation students are given an "allowance" and assigned a certain number of pets that then become their responsibility to care for. Students visit different booths such as food, entertainment, candy shop, toy store, pet care, health and wellness, and veterinary expense. In October, we piloted the class with fifth graders at Candor Elementary School. We have plans to expand the program into Star Elementary and Mt. Gilead Elementary in November and continuing expanding it with other schools in the following months.



Elizabeth's Healthy Recipe Corner

Crustless Pumpkin Pie



Ingredients

- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup <u>Master Mix</u>
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 can evaporated milk, nonfat (about 14 ounces)
- 2 eggs
- 1 can pumpkin (15 ounces)
- 3 1/2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Directions

- 1. Wash hands with soap and water.
- 2. Preheat the oven to 350 °F and lightly grease a 9

or 10 inch pie plate.

- 3. Combine all ingredients in a medium mixing bowl or a blender.
- 4. Beat 2 minutes with a mixer until smooth, or blend in the blender on high for one minute.
- 5. Pour into the pie plate.
- 6. Bake until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean, about 50 to 55 minutes.
- 7. Cool slightly and keep refrigerated. Serve with whipped topping or ice cream.

Master Mix Recipe

Ingredients:

- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 4 cups whole wheat flour
- 1 1/3 cup dry milk, nonfat
- 1/4 Tbsp. baking powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 cups shortening

Directions:

- 1. In a large bowl combine all-purpose flour, whole wheat flour, dry milk, baking powder and salt and mix thoroughly.
- 2. Cut in shortening with pastry blender or two knives until mixture resembles coarse corn meal.
- 3. Store in containers in the refrigerator.

NOTE: The final product of this recipe is intended to be used as an ingredient in other recipes and not as a ready to eat product.

Echinacea and Chamomile Class:

On October 12th, Randolph County Cooperative Extension hosted a workshop on growing Echinacea and Chamomile as a medicinal plant crop. Facilitated by Cody Craddock (Randolph), presenters Sam Boring (Davidson) and Melinda Roberts (Iredell) discussed considerations for growing these crops as well as growing market opportunities. The species in discussion are native, relatively low maintenance and input, and fetch a premium price with the right buyer.
