Regional Chicken Project

The Regional Chicken Project is an opportunity for youth in 4-H and FFA to learn more about the livestock industry. Throughout this project, youth will get to choose laying hen and/or broiler chicks to raise. The birds will be raised and youth will complete a project record book to chronicle their care and knowledge learned about chickens. Youth will also compete in a chicken show where they will demonstrate to the judge their knowledge of their birds. Training will be provided through Zoom and in person workshops. At the end of the project youth who raised broilers will donate them to be processed and given to a local food bank. Laying hens can be kept to lay eggs for potential egg business and future shows and projects.

Three Schools Graduate Go, Glow, Grow Program



The Nutrition Educator and Family and Consumer Sciences Agent completed the Go, Glow, Grow program at three schools in November and December. Two Pre-K classes at Troy Elementary School and

two more at Star Elementary successfully completed the curriculum, learning all about how to make our bodies healthy and strong. In addition to education provided in the classroom, bilingual parent newsletters were sent home with every session to encourage nutrition and physical activity at home. As in previous years, teachers were very responsive to the program, and welcomed our staff into their classrooms. Teachers reported that students looked forward to the lessons, that the lessons fully met the early childhood education goals, and that they noticed children trying more healthy foods in the cafeteria.

In 2024, we plan to continue implementing the Go, Glow, Grow Program until we reach every Pre-K student in Montgomery County, in public and private settings. Additionally in 2024, we hope to launch the Organ Wise program with elementary school students.





Elizabeth's Healthy Recipe Corner



Cream of Broccoli Soup

This creamy soup makes a perfect lunch or dinner. Keep it healthy using fat-free milk and fresh or frozen broccoli.

Ingredients

- 1 1/2 cups chicken broth, low-sodium
- 1/2 cup onion (chopped)
- 2 cups broccoli (cut)
- 1/2 teaspoon thyme (dried, crushed)
- 2 bay leaves (small)
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- Pepper (dash, optional)
- 1 cup non-fat milk
- Garlic powder (dash, optional)

Directions

- Wash hands with soap and water.
- In a saucepan combine chicken broth, chopped onion, broccoli, thyme, bay leaf and garlic powder. Bring mixture to boiling. Reduce heat; cover and simmer for 10 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Remove bay leaf.
- Place half of the mixture in a blender or food processor, cover and blend 30 to 60 seconds or until smooth. Pour into a bowl; repeat with remaining vegetable mixture, set all aside.
- In the same saucepan warm the oil. Stir in flour, salt, and pepper. Add the milk all at once, stirring rapidly with a wire whisk. Cook and stir until mixture is thickened and bubbly. Stir in the blended broccoli mixture. Cook and stir until soup is heated through. Season to taste with additional salt and pepper.
