The volunteers have had a busy month! On Saturday April 6, student volunteers in training visited the JC Ralston Arboretum in Raleigh and the NC Botanical Garden in Chapel Hill.

These public gardens demonstrated horticulture techniques varying in mission, and students learned differences between introducing new garden species and conserving historic native plants. Finally, students concluded the educational piece of their volunteer training on April 29, and will be examined on May 6. The Certified volunteers have been active in the Montgomery Community College greenhouses twice a week, growing plants for their upcoming sale on May 3-4. We are so thankful for Kim Johnson, MCC Sustainable Agriculture Director, who has generously given of her time, expertise, and grant funded materials for the volunteers to use. Many plants will be available at the sale, including flowering annuals, hanging baskets, garden edibles, herbs, perennials, native plants, and more. Everything Rolled food truck will be on site May 3, helping to draw customers and boost sales for our hard working Extension Master Gardener Volunteers. The April and May business meetings were held April 8 and April 29 with a strong focus on plant sale planning. The next business meeting will be June 3 at 5:30pm.

Family & Consumer Sciences Updates Rhonda Peters, FCS Agent Elizabeth Thompson, Nutrition Educator



April was a whirlwind of activity for the Family & Consumer Science program as we continued our Bingocize program at Brutonville Community Center, started a new series of OrganWise Guys at Troy Elementary, continued our Go, Glow, Grow program at Wescare Center for Children, and participated in mental health fairs at Montgomery County Early College as well as Montgomery Central High School. Professional development was also a priority for FCS in the month of April, as the FCS Agent and Nutrition Educator both attended three days of training in Greensboro. Additionally, the FCS Agent attended a one day meat preservation workshop in Raleigh.

In May, we plan to conclude the Go, Glow, Grow program at Wescare, which will have served 31 students and four teachers. We will also conclude the Bingocize program, which has averaged approximately 11 participants per session. We look forward to sharing more specific results of these efforts with you next month. In May, we have also started the Babysitter's Backpack program, which will provide youth with the education and practical experience to effectively care for younger children and help them start their own babysitting business. This program will conclude in June.

June, of course, will start our summer programming in partnership with 4-H Youth Development. We are excited to offer programming in the areas of nutrition and wellness, financial management, and life skills. We look forward to this collaboration every year with our community and our Agriculture and 4-H programs in our office. In July, we will be providing the Safe Plates class, a food safety program, for food handlers at Blake's Restaurant.

Quick Black Bean Salad

Ingredients

1 can black beans, low-sodium (15.5 ounces) 1 1/2 10-ounce packages frozen corn 1/2 cup salsa

Directions

1. Wash hands with soap and water.

2. Leave frozen corn in the fridge overnight to defrost. If you forget to do this ahead of time, defrost it in the microwave.

3. Drain and rinse the black beans.

4. Combine all ingredients together and serve as a side dish.
