The EMGVs met on August 5th at 5:30pm. The volunteers have had a busy month maintaining the four community gardens in the county. In Mt. Gilead, much of the produce is being harvested and donated back into the community. Similarly, the Troy Senior Center Garden provides senior visitors with fresh tomatoes. Finally, on August 13th two volunteers educated the community on pollinator gardening at the Troy Library. The group will meet next on September 9th for a harvest dinner party.



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Pesticide Applicator Recertification

On August 20, over 25 individuals joined Montgomery County Extension for pesticide applicator recertification courses. Four credits were offered. Two V credits covered state pesticide updates, as well as new regulations as they apply to Paraquat applications. Two X Credits covered generic pesticide safety. Agriculture Agents Owen and Emi taught the X credits, which focused on fungicide usage and integrated deer management. NC Zoo Spray Trial



On August 27th, Agriculture Agent Owen Washam was invited to participate in an herbicide trial with the NC Zoo. The Zoo owns numerous acres of land off

NC 134 near Star which were previously owned by the Nichols family. The family has moved on, but expressed interest in promoting the growth of longleaf pines on the land. The spray trial supports this goal by studying which treatments are most effective against ornamental bittersweet, *Celastrus orbiculatus*. The results will be studied over the next three years and results published.

Montgomery County Beekeeper Association

The Beekeepers met on August 15. The group heard from Agriculture Agent Owen Washam who educated the group on plants that provide quality bee forage. Over forty species were discussed, as well as locations to purchase seeds or plants. The beekeepers will meet next on September 19th at 6:00pm at Montgomery Community College.



The Meat Conference 2024 in Boone, NC

At the end of July, the livestock agent, Emi Briggs had the opportunity to go to the Meat Conference in Boone, NC. There were many amazing opportunities to learn about butchery, livestock management, soil manage-



ment, pasture management, and connect with local and national producers in the meat industry. There were several amazing keynote speakers including Temple Grandin, PhD. Temple Grandin discussed animal welfare, humane handling, thinking in the terms of livestock, and gave examples of successful transitions in processing and livestock handling facilities of how a small, simple change such as lighting can make a big difference.

At the conference, there were many demon-

strations of many different things. One of the demos was a lamb butchery demo and market analysis of how each cut matters to the butcher and consumer. Another demo was a quarter beef demo and how different cuts of meats



could be labeled to make the most profit. One of the most intriguing things about both butchery demos is the market comparisons included in each demo.

Another interesting demo was a virtual fence demo. The virtual fence allowed cattle or small ruminants to graze areas of land that do not have existing fencing. The transition to this type of fencing, while not the most affordable option but still less expensive than permanent fencing, creates more land for grazing. The demos, educational speakers, community outreach, and connecting was fantastic and will allow for more in depth conversation to be had with local farmers to better support them and their businesses.





V.A.D. Meeting

On August 27th, the Voluntary Agricultural District Advisory Board met to discuss the new Voluntary Agricultural District (V.A.D.) sign design. The new sign design was voted on and passed. The purchasing of an order of the new signs was voted on and passed as well. Advertisement for the V.A.D. and the placement of posters around the county to help invite and inform local farmers of the benefits of the V.A.D. was discussed. The next meeting will be announced when the board has another voting item.

Elizabeth's Healthy Recipe Corner

Apple Crisp Recipe . . .

This apple crisp is a delicious dessert and a great way to enjoy fall's bounty from the orchard.



Ingredients

- 4 medium apples
- 1/4 cup oatmeal, quick cooking
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon cinnamon
- 1/4 cup margarine

Directions

- 1. Wash hands with soap and water.
- 2. Preheat the oven to 350 °F.
- 3. Grease the bottom and sides of a square 9×9 " pan.
- 4. Remove the cores from the apples. Slice the apples. Spread the sliced apples on the bottom of the pan.
- 5. Cut the margarine into small pieces and put in a medium-sized bowl.
- 6. Add the oatmeal, flour, brown sugar and cinnamon.
- 7. Using two knives, cut the margarine into the mixture until it looks like small crumbs.
- 8. Sprinkle the mixture over the top of the apples.

Bake in the oven for about 20 minutes.
